FEAST OF THE ENTRANCE OF THE THEOTOKOS

When Mary was three years of age, Joachim and Anne took their daughter, Mary to the Temple so that she might be consecrated to the service of the Lord. According to legend, they invited the young girls of the town to walk before her with lighted torches. When they reached the Temple, Mary went up the steps of the sanctuary where she remained living in the contemplation of God and miraculously fed by the Archangel Gabriel, until the day she was espoused to Joseph. Theme of this Feast is that Mary, the Immaculate One, Temple of the Living God, is offered to the Almighty in his holy house in Jerusalem. This day witnesses the bond between the Word and The Virgin predestined in eternity; this day is the fountainhead of all her privileges.
